4-10 August 2019 | Jonah 1-4

The Message. God is "gracious ... and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love" (Jonah 4:2).

Context. Jonah ministered during the reign of Jeroboam II in the Northern Kingdom (Israel). The Bible records that his prophecy came to pass in 2 Kings 14:23-25. In the current book, God commanded Jonah to go to Nineveh (the capital of Assyria) to proclaim God's judgment over the sinful city. Jonah ran away from his call because he did not want Ninevites to repent and avoid God's judgment. The reason for this was probably because of their brutality, violence, & wickedness and Israel's bitter history with them (2 Kings 14:23–28). Watch the Bible's project video here.

Insight

Nineveh & Sodom. Jonah's Nineveh is thematically connected to Sodom, another biblical city of evil (Gen 18-19). God tells Abraham that the outcry against Sodom is such that he "must go down" to investigate (Gen 18:21). Similarly, God sends Jonah to Nineveh, "the great city," telling him that its evil "has come up" before him (Jonah 1:2). Gen 19:25 describes God's destruction of Sodom using a term usually translated as "overthrow," the same term Jonah uses in his prophetic preaching to Nineveh (Jonah 3:4). (Bolin).

<u>Tarshish</u>. ... Tarshish ... was thought to be towards the end of the earth, and is always associated with ships in the Bible. Jonah wanted to go as far as he could to escape God's presence, but this was a futile attempt. ... In heading for Tarshish, Jonah intended to get as far away from Nineveh and the calling of God to go there as he possibly could. (Guzik).
